From the Desk...

This quarter has been quite engaging and eventful. We began October month with meaningful celebration of Gandhi Jayanti and World Wildlife Week. We carried the message of Father of Nation, Mahatma Gandhi i.e., "The greatness of a nation and its moral progress can be judged by the way in which its animals are treated" to a maximum number of local people and zoo visitors through activities like Conservation Talk and exhibition of photographs of participants of Wildlife Photography Competition. This year, the renowned pacer in Cricket world Sri Javagal Shrinath inaugurated the exhibition of photographs in the presence of Sri. B.P.Ravi IFS, Member Secretary, Zoo Authority of Karnataka and Sri. Ajit Kulkarni IFS, Executive Director, Mysuru Zoo.

On the account of 22nd Conservation speak Kumari Varshini S shared her views on importance of conserving birds and discussed various issues related to conservation of birds. Later, Sri Ameya Gode, talked about "Forest Fires: Past and Present" and emphasized how climate change is playing a major role in Forest fires and how space technology could be used by forest managers to control the forest fire.

As a part of Conservation education program various literary competitions like Essay writing, Quiz and Elocution Competition for school and college students were held during this period. The participation of students was overwhelming.

Another major event of this period was a day workshop on "Emerging Diseases in Asian Elephants" for all the zoo's of Karnataka and staff and officials associated with Elephant Camp and Wild Elephants management in the state of Karnataka. This workshop was organized with special emphasis on Elephant Herpes Virus. Veterinarians and Scientists who are working on Elephants share their knowledge about elephant health care management and herpes virus issue in Asian Elephants.

Another important milestone achieved by our zoo is selection of Volunteer Zoo Educators to create awareness about conservation amongst visitors of zoo especially children form rural schools. Out of 50 candidates who participated in training program 10 were finally selected based on written test. These volunteers have started accompanying school children on weekends during zoo rounds and making their visit to zoo more fruitful and informative.

In order to create awareness about importance of urban lakes and to motivate people for their conservation two day Karanji Lake Festival was organized. Several wetland and bird experts and nature enthusiasts actively participated in this event and created awareness about urban lakes.

During this period we could transport a male Giraffe calf to Guwahati Zoo as a part of animal exchange and this is longest ever transportation of Giraffe by road in our country. Zoo Veterinarians, RFO's, Animal Supervisors and Animals Keepers deserves special credits for accomplishing this difficult task. We received a pair of Hoolock Gibbon, a female Indian Rhinoceros and a female black leopard from Assam State Zoo during this period. These new members will be new attractions of Mysore Zoo.

I hope coming year brings more joy and learning to Zoo visitors and we improve further in meeting the expectations of Zoo visitors as well as maintain highest standards in Zoo animal's welfare. Best Wishes!

Conservation of Birds and Forest fires: Past and Present



Bird's play an important role in ecosystem. Due to various anthropogenic activities, their population is decreasing. There is a need to understand about birds and their conservation. Recent days one of the biggest issue contributing to climate change is Forest fires. Forest fire is also a threat to fauna and flora. 5. Training program for Volunteer Zoo Educators





Mysuru Zoo initiated an innovative program i.e. Volunteer Zoo Educators, to educate government school students about Zoo animals and maintenance of the zoo. Training program was organized for 50 members on 12, 13 and 19, 20th of October 2019.

This training program was inaugurated by Sri. B.P. Ravi IFS., Additional Principal Chief Conservator of Forests & Member Secretary, Zoo Authority of Karnataka, Mysuru. Sri Ajit Kulkarni IFS Executive director Mysuru Zoo and Dr K R Ramesh Assistant Director were present at this occasion.

Participants were exposed to various issues pertaining to conservation and the role which Zoo's play in conservation. Based on screening test, 10 candidates were selected to become volunteers at Zoo.





6 Workshop on "Emerging Diseases in Asian Elephants"



One day workshop on "Emerging disease in Asian Elephants" was organised on 25/10/2019 for veterinarians and officials of zoos of Karnatka and Karnataka State Forest Department who are involved in health care management of captive and wild Elephants. Special emphasis was given to herpes virus problem in Asiatic Elephants. In this workshop, Dr. Arun Zachariah, Forest Veterinary Officer, Department of Forests and Wildlife, Government of Kerala, Dr. Vinay S, Chief Veterinary Officer, Shivamogga Wildlife Division, Karnataka, Dr. B. Manjunath, Scientist, Wild Animals Disease Diagnostic Laboratory, IAH&VB, Bannerghatta Biological Park, Bannerghatta, Bangalore, Dr. Sanjeev Kumar, Senior Scientist, SRDDL, Diagnostic Virology Division, IAH&VB, Bangalore, participated as resource persons and shared their experience with participants.

Karanji Lake Festival was celebrated by Mysore Zoo on 16th and 17th of December to create awareness about importance of lakes and their conservation. The festival was inaugurated by Mysore City Corporation Mayor Smt. Pushpalatha Jagannath. Sri. B.P. Ravi IFS., Additional Principal Chief Conservator of Forests and Member Secretary, Zoo Authority of Karnataka, Smt. Chaya Naveen, Corporate, Ittigegud, Smt.
